"Where are you from?" "De donde eres?" One question, asked in various ways, seeking a particular answer depending on who has asked. It's a unique experience for the second and third generation kids. In a city that was and is still being built by immigrants, where do we fit in? Most of us never learned our native language fluently, so as to make it easier to excel in academics and the professional world leaving us floating between the two worlds of the land of opportunity and the lands of our cultures.

Deemed not "enough" by both our families back home and our neighbors here. The Bronx is our native land. We have blossomed from its soil. But the seeds arrived from lands oftentimes far away. How do we connect with our culture in a city of a million different cultures all at once? These are the questions that Lizzy Alejandro, Alexis Marie Montoya, and Kamille Vargas-Estrella are seeking to answer through their work.

Lizzy Alejandro's text works bring to life Spanglish phrases and Spanish slang and phrases every child knows, even those of us who didn't speak the language growing up. Drawing from past experiences, Alejandro sets out to dismantle and challenge topics considered taboo while creating dialogue within the works relating to history and personal experience.

Alexis Marie Montoya's thoughtful and intricate collages intertwine many cultures all at once. Through her re-creating art based on collecting art from elsewhere, Montoya examines her own relationship with her culture, especially through the eyes and taste—the intersection of food and culture, especially in the Bronx and Latine communities.

And Kamille Vargas-Estrella's photographs capture her fellow neighbors of the borough, often grappling with their own identities. From water-towers overlooking hidden parks where her daughter plays, to daily activities of her fellow Bronxites, Vargas-Estrella celebrates where she comes from with a quiet strength that invites viewers to explore her hometown. Through her lens, she examines her own place.

As each artist tackles the questions of their identity and societal issues, one question can be answered the same by each of us. "I am from HERE." "Yo soy de AQUÍ." The Bronx raised us. Our culture has made us. And we don't stop.

Alexis Marie Montoya is a Puerto Rican and Peruvian multidisciplinary artist and food writer born, raised, and based in The Bronx. Her work examines the intersection of food and culture, especially within Bronx and Latinx communities. Alexis is a former line cook, food educator, and organizer who leans on her experience to inform her artistic practice.

Alexis earned a bachelor's degree in Advertising and Public Relations and a minor in Visual Culture from the Rochester Institute of Technology. In 2023, she was a BronxArtSpace Governors Island Artist-in-Residence. She has exhibited work at BronxArtSpace, Casita Maria Gallery, and Bronx River Art Center (BRAC).
